


Independence in the Modern World. Wealthier, Happier, Fairer: Why not Scotland?

People should be informed about their choice in a referendum. We will have a set of papers to inform people of the issues.




This is the first of those papers. It looks at the UK and compares it to other countries in Europe. The countries we compare with are Austria, Belgium, Denmark, Iceland, Ireland, Finland, the Netherlands, Norway, Sweden, and Switzerland.



The paper is based on information from respected organisations. The information shows that:



- These countries are wealthier than the UK.
- Income inequality is lower in these countries.
- Poverty rates are lower in these countries.
- There are fewer children living in poverty in these countries.
- Most of these countries are happier than the UK.




These countries are wealthier, happier and fairer.

But an independent Scotland could be successful. This would be due to the decisions it would make and the talent of the people who live here.




An independent Scotland would have full powers. We can then build a country which matches these other countries.
